Child Nutrition Reauthorization (CNR) and the Child Nutrition Programs

<u>Child Nutrition Reauthorization (CNR)</u> is the process Congress uses to update the Child Nutrition programs, including the School Breakfast Program (SBP), National School Lunch Program (NSLP), Summer and Afterschool Nutrition Programs, the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP), and the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC). CNR generally occurs every 5 years, but Congress has not passed CNR legislation since 2010 – leaving the Child Nutrition programs without significant improvements. CNR is a critical opportunity for Congress to improve the programs and help end child hunger. Learn more about <u>Feeding America's CNR priorities</u>.

Summer Electronic Benefit Transfer Program (Summer EBT) <u>Learn more</u>	Summer EBT program pilots started more than a decade ago and have led to positive results, including reducing food insecurity and improving nutrition. More recently, the Pandemic EBT program, modeled after Summer EBT, found similar positive results.	Congress should provide a Summer Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) grocery card to families with children eligible for free and reduced-price school meals during the summer months and when schools are closed to supplement their household food budgets.

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
