FARM BILL:

Help End Hunger in our Community

The farm bill is federal legislation that governs many nutrition and agriculture programs, and it is up for renewal. This legislation allocates funding for The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). Together these programs help to bridge the food gap for millions of families and individuals facing hunger across the country.

Feeding America urges Congress to support and strengthen our nation's nutrition and agriculture programs in the next farm bill.

- 1 Understand the Scale of Hunger in America
 - Hunger exists in every county, parish and borough in the United States. Nearly 44 million people, including more than 13 million children, face hunger in the U.S.¹
 - As grocery bills and other costs of living continue to rise, more households are turning to food banks to meet their needs.
 - 49 million people turned to the charitable food sector for help in 2022.2
 - In 2022, food prices increased by 9.9%. In 2023, food prices increased by 5.8%.3
 - A recent survey found that 82% of likely voters are concerned about high food prices.4

TEFAP and SNAP work together to help ensure people in our community can put food on the table every day.

In a recent survey, 93% of likely voters said that TEFAP is an important program.⁵

TEFAP helped 193 food banks in the Feeding America network distribute 749 million meals in 2023.6



SNAP helped more than 42 million people access nutritious foods in 2023.7

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Strengthening federal food and nutrition programs helps ensure that no one in our country goes hungry. Here are recommended investments for both TEFAP and SNAP.

TEFAP



Double funding for TEFAP food purchases. This will help ensure food banks can serve everyone who comes through their doors, and it will support the U.S. agricultural economy.

SNAP



Ensure SNAP's purchasing power aligns with rising grocery prices and provides adequate support during tough economic times. This will decrease the need for charitable food assistance, helping to reduce the strain on food banks.



Increase funding for TEFAP storage and distribution to \$200 million per year. This will help food banks offset the cost of storing and transporting USDA foods.



Simplify SNAP eligibility and enrollment for older adults, college students, veterans, working families, immigrants and other people facing barriers. Protect SNAP choice and focus on ensuring affordable access to nutritious foods.



Continue to provide \$15 million per year for TEFAP infrastructure grants. This program helps expand the capacity and infrastructure of food banks in rural areas.



Improve assistance to individuals seeking employment

by supporting effective state employment and job training programs and ensuring people have access to SNAP benefits as they find work.



Boost funding for the TEFAP Farm to Food Bank Program,

which funds state projects to harvest, package and transport food donations from local farmers.



Allow Puerto Rico and other U.S. territories to participate fully in SNAP and extend flexibility to Native communities to administer the program
